- What else could we do together to remember what Jesus has done for us?


TAKE-HOME IDEA





















MEALTIME CARDS

- What is the strangest fact you have found out today?
- What is the most amazing thing you know about Jesus?
- Where do you think Jesus is now?

TAKE-HOME IDEA

At home, make and hide resurrection eggs for an Easter egg hunt with a twist.

You will need: twelve hollow plastic eggs that can be opened; marker pen; objects listed below; Bible verse printouts

Number the eggs, then place each of the following eleven items in an egg with the corresponding verse. The twelfth egg should remain empty apart from the verse.

- 1. Small green leaf
- 2. Piece of bread
- 3. Coin
- 4. Piece of string
- 5. Small thorn (use a twisted pipe cleaner if you prefer)
- 6. Cross (make one out of card or using toothpicks if you don't already have a small enough one)
- 7. Nails
- 8. Dice
- 9. Piece of sponge
- 10. Spear (Lego sword/toothpick, etc.)
- 11. Rock (small stone)

Hide the eggs in a trail around the house or in the garden. Look for them as a family and open each egg to look at the object inside. Ask the children if they know what it is or what it represents. Read each verse together and ask the children again what each object represents.

On Easter Sunday morning, enjoy some pastries as you read Luke 24:1–12 together as a family. Thank Jesus that he died and rose again to be your friend.



Bible verses for resurrection eggs:

- John 12:13 (NCV): 'They took branches of palm trees and went out to meet Jesus, shouting, "Praise God! God bless the One who comes in the name of the Lord! God bless the King of Israel!"'
- 2. Matthew 26:26 (NCV): 'While they were eating, Jesus took some bread and thanked God for it and broke it. Then he gave it to his followers and said, "Take this bread and eat it; this is my body."'
- 3. Matthew 26:14–15 (ERV): 'Then one of the twelve followers went to talk to the leading priests. This was the follower named Judas Iscariot. He said, "I will hand Jesus over to you. What will you pay me for doing this?" The priests gave him 30 silver coins.'
- 4. Matthew 27:26 (ERV): 'Then Pilate set Barabbas free. And he told some soldiers to beat Jesus with whips.'
- 5. Matthew 27:29 (NCV): 'Using thorny branches [the soldiers] made a crown, put it on [Jesus'] head, and put a stick in his right hand. Then the soldiers bowed before Jesus and made fun of him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" '
- 6. John 19:17–18 (NCV): 'Carrying his own cross, Jesus went out to a place called The Place of the Skull, which in the Hebrew language is called Golgotha.'
- 7. Mark 15:25–27 (NCV): 'It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified Jesus. There was a sign with this charge against Jesus written on it: THE KING OF THE JEWS. They also put two robbers on crosses beside Jesus, one on the right, and the other on the left.'
- 8. Luke 23:34 (NCV): 'Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, because they don't know what they are doing." The soldiers threw lots to decide who would get his clothes.'
- 9. Matthew 27:48 (NCV): 'Quickly one of them ran and got a sponge and filled it with vinegar and tied it to a stick and gave it to Jesus to drink.'
- 10. John 19:34 (NCV): 'One of the soldiers stuck his spear into Jesus' side, and at once blood and water came out.'
- 11. Matthew 27:59–60 (NCV): 'Then Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth. He put Jesus' body in a new tomb that he had cut out of a wall of rock, and he rolled a very large stone to block the entrance of the tomb. Then Joseph went away.'
- 12. Matthew 28:6 (NCV): 'He is not here. He has risen from the dead as he said he would. Come and see the place where his body was.'

EASTER SCAVENGERS

Something black = sin

Sticks = cross

Something red = Jesus' blood

Piece of cloth = linen cloth


Rock = tomb


Something empty = Jesus is not here, he has risen!


