Messy Vintage is a flexible way of 'doing church' that anyone can adapt for any setting – in the community, churches or care homes.

Messy Vintage is **Christ-centred** and **creative**. It is full of **celebration** and **hospitality** and is **open to all**. Where possible, it aspires to include people of all ages, while specifically reaching out to older people.

What happens at Messy Vintage?

A typical Messy Vintage session lasts one and a half to two hours and involves:

- hands-on creative activities to explore a Bible story
- a short celebration with story, song and prayer, lasting 15–20 minutes
- refreshments.

You can choose the right venue, format, timing and grouping for your own Messy Vintage.

At a church

You might hold your Messy Vintage in a church or hall, with craft activities that would suit an older person, a celebration and refreshments.

In care homes

Messy Vintage works well in care homes. It involves a celebration using all the senses that staff, residents and volunteers can participate in together. It can be timed to end with grace before a meal or refreshments.

Messy Vintage began in Jersey, pioneered by Katie Norman in churches and care homes, as well as hospital units for people living with advanced dementia. It is now run in a variety of venues all over the country. Could you start a Messy Vintage group in your locality?

Once you've decided on the venue, timing and who is invited, you'll need to organise some helpers, resources and art or craft materials. We suggest a team of five to ten volunteers.
